SOME BIDDING IDEAS

Rule of Twenty

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This can allow you to bid if you are in 1st or 2nd biding position, have two long suits, but 'not enough' high card points to open. Add the number of high card points to the number of cards in your two longest suits. If the addition comes to 20 or more, then you can legitimately open the bidding with one of your best suits.

Casino Count Bidding

This can allow you to open the bidding in 3rd or 4th biding position. Add the number of high card points to the number of spades. If the addition comes to 15 or more, you can legitimately open with one of your best suit.

Control Bidding

This is a system you can use after your partner has opened 2C. A control in this situation is either a King or an Ace, with a King having a count of 1 and an ace having a count of 2.

If you have 0 or 1 control cards bid 2D

If you have 2 control cards bid 2H

If you have 3 control cards bid 2S

If you have 4 control cards including 2 Aces bid 2NT

If you have 4 control cards (1Ace, 3 Kings) bid 3C

If you have 5 control cards bid 3D

This system provides your partner with a lot of useful information in one bid which may allow you to reach the best final contract.

Reporting inappropriate behavior

INTERESTING HAND

Assessment of long-suited hands is always an interesting topic in bridge. The topic becomes especially intriguing when **TWO** long suits occur in the one hand. If you use a conventional approach such as counting high card points and ace-asking bids for assessment, you will almost invariably not bid the hand to its full potential. Long-suited hands are highly unusual distributions, and normal bidding systems that have been developed in bridge over numerous decades to cover the most common or "usual" hands are mostly inadequate to describe "unusual" hands.


Here's an instructive example of a 2 suited hand that was played recently at the Club. The bidding is mostly straight forward but you would never get to the cold small slam if you stuck rigidly to a point count, as NS have only 23 points between them - not even enough for game in strict terms!

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So it is no surprise to hear that a variety of contracts were settled in the auction. The hand was played 8 times, 4 times in 4 spades making 10, 11, and 12 tricks, once in 2 spades making 10 tricks, 2 times in clubs part scores making 11 and 9 tricks, and only once in 6 clubs making 12 tricks.



North opened 1 spade with 14 points, two strong 6 card suits and importantly, a 3-loser count. All North needed to know was if South had 2 aces in the 10 points shown by the 2D bid, and which suit was preferred, spades or clubs. North chose to ask for aces via Blackwood in case partner thought a 4 club bid was Gerber. When South showed 2 aces, North bid 6 clubs. South then realised the 6-6 distribution and passed with the club support.

In playing this hand, trumps will be no problem but Declarer **MUST** firstly set up the second suit with enough rounds of ruffs to ensure the Queen of spades will eventually drop on the King before drawing trumps.

The guideline with long suits as shown in this example is:

- Use loser counts rather than high card points to assess long suited hands such as this
- Be careful with Ace asking, it can sometime raise more questions than answers where there are
- voids. In this particular case it was straight forward but what if declarer was missing 2 Aces? Before drawing trumps, set up the second long suit first to bring home the bacon later.
- Be wary of opponents ruffing ability before drawing trumps. Where there's long suits and voids in your hand, there will be a similar shape also in the opponents' hands.
