


Shirley Strike's family have donated a large set of decorative coffee mugs to the club in appreciation of the use of the club premises for Shirley's wake in April.


Our air conditioning contractor has advised that the two new units will arrive in June and they will install them on Wednesday, 22 June.



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CELEBRATING THE SUCCESSFULL 26th BARRIER REEF CONGRESS

HOSTED BY THE TOWNSVILLE BRIDGE CLUB



(An Extract) 27th Barrier Reef Congress – Townsville 2022 Tournament Organiser's Report – Margaret DOUSET



As in 2018, the Barrier Reef Congress was held mid-week from Monday 9 to Friday 13 May 2022 at the Townsville RSL Stadium.

A slow start to nominations increased after our successful week-long assistance program in mid-March registered players who did not have the technical ability or a computer to use MyABF.

Several players withdrew before the event as they became ill with the virus. Sam Bishop, our Partnership person, worked tirelessly to ensure all the broken teams and pairs had a 'good fit' with the local players who offered to step in at the last minute. Congratulations to Sam and all her player

volunteers who helped the Congress run as smoothly as it did.

A total of 104 sets of boards (nearly 3,000 packs of cards!) were dealt. Special thanks to our dealers. You did an amazing job! Thanks also to the team of volunteers who assembled hundreds of the new wallets and transferred the cards from boards to the wallets.

Directors & Caddies:

Dr Laurie Kelso and Peter Busch were the directors and were very recognisable in their tropical congress shirts.

Eleven caddies, two for each session, were sourced from our supervised play group and two novices. It was a good way for most of them to experience the congress without the stress of playing. Their tropical shirts were also effective and noticeable. Congratulations! You did a great job.

Financials:

Due to increased venue hire from \$4,740 in 2018 to \$9,193.30, and the 'preferred' caterer charges of nearly \$5,000 more than our 2018 option, the committee decided to 'spread the load' and increase the entry fees to ensure the event did not run at a loss for the club.

In the meantime, the club submitted an application to the Townsville City Council (TCC) for a Councillor Discretionary Grant. This was approved three days before the congress. The Grant will give in-kind support towards the venue hire and refund staff/equipment costs less the GST. In other words, instead of paying the Townsville City Council the original quote of \$9,193.30, we paid \$269.84 for GST on staff/equipment. An excellent outcome!

The full financial report will be submitted to the Townsville Bridge Club at the Annual General Meeting when finalised.





FUN AND ENTERTAINMENT

I've mentioned Victor Moll previously and want to continue with his book "Bridge in the Menagerie". In contrast to his book "Card Play Technique" this book is unlikely to increase your bridge acumen but is delightfully entertaining.

I'll plagiarize an example.

A1842 J 10842 AK2 K975 Q 10 3 AQK763 654 53 Q754 k863 6 95 QJ10987 A J 109

South ends up in 3NT after North bids spades and hearts and South diamonds. West leads the 4 clubs, east plays the K and south the 10. East returns the 3 of clubs, south plays the J and west takes his K. West can now be forgiven for believing his partner has the A of clubs and continues the suit. South now wins the A and 9 of clubs discarding dummy's A and K of diamonds. He now has 7 more tricks off the top!

WHICH GRAND SLAM?

When I was teaching Roman Key Card Blackwood recently, I used the following hand:




I explained that once West opens 1 \(\psi\), you are only interested in Aces and the \(\psi\) Q, so you use RKCB immediately.

On the other hand, if West responds 5 , showing two Aces but no Q, you stop in 6 (not 6NT), because a black suit may be weak.

If opener responds $5 \spadesuit (0 \text{ key cards})$, you stop in $5 \heartsuit$; if they respond $5 \spadesuit (1 \text{ key card})$, then you should use the "Queen ask" to decided whether to play in $5 \heartsuit$ or $6 \heartsuit$.

Here's another example:



Bidding this hand were Lauren Travis (then 16yo) and Stephen Williams (then 17yo), in the finals of the Gold Coast Congress. At this point, East (Lauren) knew that West held the A-K-Q, A-K-Q, A-K, which amounted to 20 HCP. She also knew that he would have 21+ HCP to open 2 A-K, which amounted to 20 HCP. Finally, here's an example of opting for the suit contract:

♠ A K Q 3 2
 ♠ 6 3 2
 ♠ A 2
 ♠ K Q J 10 7
 ♠ A 5 4
 ♠ 7

1 ♠ 4 ♠ (splinter)


4 ♦ (cue bid) 4 ♥ (cue bid, wanting West to 'take over')

4NT 5 ♠ (1 key card)

5NT (all key cards held) 7 🛖

After the 5NT bid, East knows that West holds \triangle A-K-Q-x-x (or more), \spadesuit A and \triangle A. Therefore, they can count: 5 spades, 1 heart, 5 diamonds, 1 club, 1 club ruff = 13. These 13 tricks involve trumping, thus you opt for 7 \spadesuit (not 7NT, which you could bid with an extra diamond).

The second cruise was when the person who had been appointed unfortunately had to disembark at Adelaide because his wife had broken her leg whilst boarding the ship and a quick email to other potential people was sent out asking if anyone could be in Perth within 24 hours to join the ship and travel to Singapore. Because it was such short notice they even paid my air fares and I stayed an extra week to walk around the gardens.

The third cruise was from LA to Japan (22 days) and I took another friend on that one. It was full on during days at sea (32 students each day and organising games all afternoon) but the port days were free to go ashore and explore. My friend and I had a week in LA prior to the cruise and a week in Japan after disembarking.

I really enjoyed those times and the opportunities Princess Cruises gave me.
