BRIDGE LESSONS

President Clive Bunnett provided this update.

The first set of Bridge Lessons for Beginners for the year has been completed and the current novices seem keen to continue their Bridge Education journey. A survey found a high level of satisfaction with the current approach based on the Joan Butts/Audrey Grant method of "Cards on the Table" where the learner is able to see from the hands themselves how to bid and play.

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The first six lessons focused on basic bidding and play techniques in non-competitive auctions. SIGNALS (CAN BE IGNORED)

I believe Signals are a critical part of the communication in Bridge WHEN DEFENDING a hand. When your partner leads a high honour from a sequence (e.g. K from KQJxx) they may need to know if they should continue playing the suit, or if they should find a switch to some other suit.

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Whether you just play HIGH ENCOURAGING (low discouraging) or LOW ENCOURAGING (high discouraging) or whether you play ODDS & EVENS (Odds encouraging, Evens discouraging or vice versa) you can **<u>suggest</u>** to your partner that continuing the suit is a good or bad idea by carefully selecting the card you play.

e.g. Against a Suit Contract if you have a Doubleton and hope to get a Ruff you will ENCOURAGE your partner to continue the suit, but if you have 4 small and the Declarer may get a Ruff&Slough (Discard) you will DISCOURAGE if possible. (N.B. You'll have to decide and agree with your partner if High/Low shows a Doubleton or if confirms the Discouraging first card.) In contrast, against a No Trump Contract you may decide to Discourage with a Doubleton, and Encourage with 4 small.

BUT (and it's a big BUT) **the player on lead may have to make their decision based on other information** (intuition, or just feeling lucky?) and shouldn't be criticised for their choice. Sometimes a Ruff&Slough does no harm while a switch gives away a vital trick. In the next 2 Newsletters I will look at 2 examples from a December Club Session (names withheld to protect the innocent), 1 where dismissing the signal worked and the other where "obeying" the signal was wrong. What would you do in the following situations? Remember, I'll tell you what actually happened in subsequent Newsletters.

On the 5 Clubs lead, Declarer plays the J and partner plays the 10 (discouraging - switch to a Diamond). Declarer leads the Heart from the table to the 10 and your Q. How do you continue?
