# **COMPETING AT BRIDGE (PART 2) - Bidding over artificial Calls**

How do you play the Double of an Artificial Bid? This is 1 of the many things you need to clarify with your partner(s).

Last month, playing with an occasional partner the bidding had proceeded:

3D duly made 10 tricks but reviewing the results it appeared that E/W should have been in (and making) 4H. My partner said "you did see my double?" to which I said "of course - I lead a Club, didn't I?". We apparently had a different interpretation of what the X of the (artificial) 3C bid meant. I have "always" played the X of an artificial bid as either LEAD DIRECT or just showing the suit bid (in case my partner wanted to bid something?). My partner played the X as **Takeout**. The problem I have with this approach is I don't know if she is short in Clubs (the "bid" suit) or short in Diamonds (the suit "shown"). Also, we don't know how good the fit (in Ds) is, or how strong responder is. If responder was going to follow up with a bid of 3Nt, then my bidding a Major could be disastrous.

So, with my partner's actual hand: S: Q987 H: K1074 D: - C: AQ1095 and in the "passout seat", I would have followed up with a 2nd X (for takeout). We would then find our 5/4 Heart fit. Some of the "better" players "down south" play the following: 1st X shows "values", 2nd X is for T'out, 3rd X is for Penalties. I think that reads as: "I've got something", followed by "bid something partner - I can support whatever you bid" and finally "don't bid partner, this is Business". I'm not sure what you would need to have to use that rule - a balanced 19+ HCP?

On the same theme (bidding over artificial calls) what do you bid holding: S: J983 H: - D: QJ10942 C: AQ7 after the bidding has gone:

The void in Hearts is very powerful!

Do you want (a) partner to lead the suit, (b) to tell partner you have a D suit, or (c) show partner you have a very good hand if you have a D fit? At my table, W bid 3D and the bidding proceeded:

5D was only 1 off. Even if Doubled and taken 2 off (on a small Club lead away from 10 6 4 3) it's a good result against the making 4H at the other table. No wonder we lost that match so comprehensively.

# **CLUB MEMBERSHIP, PART 1**

An article by Peter Cox "2020 A Bridge Odyssey" in the February 2021 ABF Newsletter shows that many of the traditional major clubs in Australia were badly affected by COVID and over a third were already in decline by 2019 before COVID.

Prompted by this, I wondered how the Townsville Bridge Club was travelling with memberships over recent years. A crude method of estimation on a year-by-year basis is to look at the number of members listed in the annual pocket calendars, and this has been possible thanks to Peter Hall who kindly provided that information.

The "MEMBERS" figures are on the date of publication of the calendar, effectively 1<sup>st</sup> January of the year. They include many players whose home club is Cleveland Bay but who are also members of Townsville. There are 189 members listed in the current calendar, 37 of which are CBBC home club members and 152 are Townsville, as listed on the ABF Masterpoints Centre. A reasonable assumption would be that as an approximation, the dual membership figures are constant from year to year.

So on face value, the figures in the table indicate a stable membership, pretty much for the last 30 or so years (since 1988). There is certainly no significant decline. If there was a decline due to Covid19, this should have been evident in the 2021 calendar. Remembering that the 2020 calendar is pre-Covid, the downward spike to 167 in the 2020 calendar is curious. A statistical glitch perhaps? I don't have an explanation for this, if anyone does, please let me know.

# **CLUB MEMBERSHIP, PART 2**

On 14<sup>th</sup> April 2021 (Co-incidentally the club's 54<sup>th</sup> birthday), there were 152 active home club members listed on the ABF Masterpoints Centre. The breakdown of members by rank category is tabulated below.

#### **HOW TO READ THE TABLE**

The top line of the table shows 30 members (19.7% of 152) as being in the "Nil" ranking category, i.e. they have less than 2 Masterpoints. The second line shows 5 members (3.3% of 152) as being in the "Graduate" ranking category, i.e. they have 2 to 5 Masterpoints. The 2 columns on the far right are cumulative, i.e. 35 members (23% of 152) are below the "Club" category and have less than 5 Masterpoints.

You can use the table to estimate whatever you want to consider about the makeup of the club. Highlighted are 2 features that stand out to me. They are that

- 53.9% of the club's members (in yellow highlight) are in the "Novice" category (<100 Masterpoints)</li>
- 19.8% of the club's members (in green highlight) are in the "Restricted" category (<300 Masterpoints)</li>

# How can we better engage our Novice and Restricted players?

The Novice and Restricted players together constitute 73.7% of the club (112 of 152). The obvious question is "Can we do more in terms of putting on more events or sessions to accommodate this significant group?" Undoubtedly the answer is "Yes".

# CLEVELAND BAY BRIDGE CLUB EVENT - Diggers Congress 22 - 25 April 2021



You're not making much progress I see"


Of course you're intent on improving,
