

BRIDGE TIPS FOR BEGINNERS

- You cannot expect your partner to defend properly if you make faces or show other signs of disapproval.
- The speed of the play, may be a clue to declarer's problem. When playing a 4-3 trump fit, play usually slows to a crawl.
- Give your opening lead a little consideration. The fate of many a contract is determined by that one card. Use the bidding as a guide.
- A player who hesitates during the bidding is likely to have a problem hand. Keep the hesitation in mind



Stayman Convention

The convention is named after Sam Stayman, who wrote the first published description in 1945, but its inventors were two other players: the British expert Jack Marx in 1939, who published it only in 1946 and Stayman's regular partner George Rapée in 1944.

Stayman is a convention used for locating a 4-4 major suit fit after partner opens 1NT. It is one of the most widely used conventions in the world, since a major suit contract is often preferable to no-trumps.

Why is a major game contract better than a No Trump game contract? Its all about the odds.

The success rate for a game contract in a major suit where you hold an eight card fit is around 80%, as opposed to a game contract in 3NT which has a success rate of only 60%. A game contract made in a major suit scores better than a game contract bid in notrumps.

However, there are some other factors to consider.

Stayman is not recommended with a 4-3-3-3 distribution as dummy has no ruffing power. So, No Trumps is the better bid.



Bridge Topic of the Wee

ALERTING STAYMAN BIDS

- A response of 2♣ after a 1NT opening bid is not alertable in an uncontested auction, no matter what the meaning.
- However, normal alerting do rules apply if (a) if the opponents have entered the auction, or (b) Stayman or similar is used in any other sequence e.g. following a 2NT opening or a 1NT response.
- Normal alerting rules also apply to all responses to Stayman and other asking bids.

It was a wonderful opportunity to play with people from all over Queensland and also Interstate. An event certainly worth considering entering in future.











Member Profile: GEOFF EALES







When and where did you first play Bridge?

I started to learn to play bridge in 2009 at the Townsville Bridge club.

Who introduced you to bridge?

My wife Maree was keen to learn. I approached Geoff Allen, then the Treasurer of the Townsville Golf Club to find out how to learn. Maree and I took up bridge together.

Who taught you to play bridge?

Betty Hobdell was my teacher. I still remember some parts of her lessons. I now realise how patient she was with us all.

Tell us some of your family background, for example where did you grow up, what is your favourite childhood memory?

I grew up on the South Burnett at Silverleaf outside
